God's Story Your Story

Sept. 14, 2014

Devotion: Use this resource at home to guide your household's daily devotions. You can do this alone, as a couple, as a family; in the morning, during the day, or at night. Find a routine that works best for you.

Pray: Light a candle and open your devotion time with a prayer. God of blessing, you promised Abraham many things that seemed unlikely. Yet you remained faithful to every single promise. Give us hope that you will remain faithful to us, even when we are tempted to lose hope, for the sake of Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Reflect: Reflect on the key verse from Sunday's reading. *I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing.* Genesis 12:2

Study: Study the reading and consider the background. God promised Abraham land. Abraham was a nomad, a wanderer in the desert with few possessions. Land would have been an unlikely blessing. But throughout his life he continued to encounter kings and others who feared Abraham's God and gave him possessions and land to keep Abraham's God from punishing them. God promised Abraham descendants. Although he and his wife, Sarah, were old, and Sarah was barren, God gave them a baby, Isaac. Through Isaac, a great nation was born. Nothing is too great for God to accomplish. God promised to bless Abraham so that Abraham would be a blessing to the world. Indeed, through Abraham's descendants King David, and then Jesus Christ came to this world. The whole world has been blessed through Abraham, as we continue to receive those blessings even today.

Read: Read the following daily readings to deepen your understanding of Sunday's text. After the reading, ask the follow-up questions.

Follow the genealogy from Abraham to Joseph. See how God's covenant with Abraham continued throughout the generations.

Sunday, Genesis 12:1-9, *Call of Abraham* Monday, Genesis 15:1-6, *God's Covenant with Abram* Tuesday, Genesis 21:1-7, *The Birth of Isaac* Wednesday, Genesis 25:19-28, *The Birth of Esau and Jacob* Thursday, Genesis 35:16-26, *The Birth of Benjamin and Death of Rachel* Friday, Genesis 37:1-11, *Joseph Dreams of Greatness* Saturday, Genesis 37:12-36, *Joseph is Sold by His Brothers* **How did God use each of the men and women in these stories to carry out God's covenant with Abraham and with humankind**?

Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household. Discuss the following questions, or simply check in with "Highs" and "Lows."

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- How is God's covenant with Abraham fulfilled today? If all humankind is now in covenant with God through the death and resurrection of Jesus, then how shall we treat one another? Where are you accepting of others? Where are you intolerant?
- How has God blessed you? What are you grateful for? Practicing gratitude is a holy practice. Do it often this week.

Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

God's blessings and promises are as numerous as the stars. Go outside at night and count the stars. Take notice of God's blessings in your life throughout the week.

Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

God who blesses others through us, through your word inspire us to live lives trusting in your promise. Amen.

Sharing GOD'S STORY @ home

<u>SCRIPTURE VERSE FOR THE WEEK</u>— "The LORD said to Abram, '...In you all the families of the earth shall be blessed"— Genesis 9:3b.

<u>PRAYER FOR THE WEEK</u>—To be used in a variety of ways over the course of the week—first thing in the morning; before you go to bed; as an opening or closing to household devotion time (see reverse); etc.

God of Promise—The promise you made to Abram wasn't just for Abram and his family. You made promises to them so that the whole world would be blessed. Thank you, Lord, for your blessings in my life. Continue to call to me so that I may come to understand those blessings in such a way that others are blessed by you through me. In Jesus' name I pray. Amen.

A BLESSING TO SHARE—A blessing can be a powerful ritual that reminds us of God's promises and presence, both through the words, as well as the touch that we share. This can be used as a "good-bye." It could be used as a bed-time blessing. Be creative in the way you bless and are blessed by the people in your life.

As you mark one another with the sign of the cross on the forehead, say,

"You have been blessed to be a blessing to others. Amen."

DAILY BIBLE READINGS—Filling in the gaps. The gap between the Sunday readings is quite large, spanning four generations from Abraham and Sarah to their son Isaac, their grandson Jacob, and their great-grandson Joseph. It may be sufficient simply to come away from this week's readings with knowledge of Abraham and Sarah's family tree. But in terms of "meaning," there are also plenty of places where the promises God has made to Abraham and Sarah's family are in serious danger. Some guiding questions for this week's readings might be "How are God's promises threatened? How are they protected or renewed?"

Sunday	Genesis 12:1-9	The call of Abram & Sarai (Abraham & Sarah)
Monday	Genesis 15:1-6	God's promises renewed
Tuesday	Genesis 21:1-7	One promise fulfilled: the birth of Isaac
Wednesday	Genesis 27:1-45	The promise is stolen and passed on
Thursday	Genesis 28:10-22	God's promise renewed, in spite of Jacob
Friday	Genesis 33:1-11	Jacob and his brother are reconciled
Saturday	Genesis 37:1-36	Jacob and his sons
Sunday	Genesis 39:1-23	Joseph in Prison

If your household includes younger children, use a child-friendly Bible like the Spark! Picture Bible (Augsburg Fortress) or The Jesus Storybook Bible (Zondervan). The Children's Illustrated Bible (New Leaf Press) is a good Bible for young readers that also includes nice illustrations and explanations. Often, you might find that the children's bible you are using may not include the very story assigned for the DAILY BIBLE READINGS. Read to your kids anyway. Just pick a story!

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<u>CARING CONVERSATIONS</u>—Each week, a topic for discussion is introduced that is connected to the weekly theme introduced by Sunday's Bible reading. This topic can be used at any time during the week. But it is not by any means the only Caring Conversation you can have—try checking in with "Highs & Lows" (What was the best/worst part of your day?) or "God moments" (Where do you think you saw God's love active and present today?). The main point is to be on the look-out for opportunities to move your household's talk from the surface toward intimacy.

- The readings this week are all about the family of Abraham and Sarah. As a family, sit down and draw your family's tree. (You can find some simple templates and hints online for doing this.) What kind of stories can you share about some of the people on that tree? Are there any "God stories" you can tell about this family tree?
- When we meet the "Father and Mother" of this family, their names are "Abram" and "Sarai." Eventually, God changes their names to "Abraham" and "Sarah." Do you know what your names mean? Can you find out? How did you get your name and why?
- God makes and keeps God's promises with Abraham & Sarah and their family and gives them visible reminders of those promises. ("Count the stars if you can," God tells Abram in Gen. 15:5.) Can you name any visible reminders of promises in your life? (Example—married people might point to their wedding rings.)

DEVOTIONS—One way of thinking about devotions is as a continuation of our community's worship, or at least as a connection with it. The following basic pattern could be one way of forming your household's devotions:

- Gathering Prayer—This might include a lit candle; the PRAYER FOR THE WEEK from the front; or a suggestion from the RITUAL & TRADITION below.
- Caring Conversation—As suggested above, this could be as simple as a daily check in with each other or an extended conversation using the topic(s) suggested above.
- Daily Bible Reading—Read aloud from the DAILY BIBLE READING from the front. What do you want to remember from this reading? Households with small children might simply review the basics of the story read from an age-appropriate Bible.
- Closing Ritual—Some way of signaling the end: A BLESSING TO SHARE from the front; the Lord's Prayer; or a song, either sung or recorded. If you used a candle, extinguish it as a sign of the end of the devotion time.

Note: This is only a suggested pattern. It will vary with YOUR household's context and patterns. What works best for you? First thing in the morning? Over breakfast? Bed time? Even if you don't have children in your household, or if you live alone, be creative and flexible with how you practice and keep your devotions.

SERVICE — SERVICE is how we enact God's great love for the entire world.

Sometimes Abraham's and Sarah's family is a MESS. What specific ways can you care for and serve your family this week?

<u>RITUALS & TRADITIONS</u>—Throughout the biblical story, God's promises are often passed on through some sort of ritual blessing. (This is what Jacob steals from his brother Esau in the Wednesday reading from Genesis 27.) This week, focus on ways of blessing each other using the BLESSING TO SHARE from the front.
