What Happens When You're Not There: The Effects of Missing Church (Source unknown)



I am a die-hard Georgia Bulldogs fan. I rarely miss a game, and if I do, be sure, it is being recorded to watch at a later time, even if I know the outcome. I love Georgia football. And if I had tickets, which I do not, I would do everything I could to go to the game. I would amend my calendar, reschedule my appointments, and prioritize my activities to ensure my attendance. But if

something happened, and I couldn't make it, it would not affect the dynamic of the crowd, or the outcome of the event. It wouldn't change, one little bit, the atmosphere. Simply put, my attendance would not be missed. The team would stick to their game-plan, the crowd would maintain their electric charge, and the prices would be exactly as they are. The same is NOT true for my attendance at church.

When a church member misses worship service, the church drastically suffers. The Bible is emphatic about church attendance. The writer of Hebrews challenges us with convicting words, "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another: and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching" (Hebrews 10:25). Have you ever thought about the effect your absence has in the House of God? When you are not there:

- The body of the congregation is incomplete
- Your voice is not heard in the worship and singing of the saints

- You cannot actively serve others who may need your gifts
- You cannot contribute in the offering
- You do not receive the Word of God in a preaching format
- You miss out on corporate prayer
- You forfeit fellowship with other believers
- You send a message to the youth that missing church is acceptable
- You make it easier to miss the next week, and then the next
- You become susceptible to apathy and indifference
- You make it harder for others to bear the weight and burdens of ministry
- You miss opportunities to share your struggles with the saints of God
- You cause unnecessary worry for your pastor, teacher, staff, and leaders
- You miss out on altar invitations, life-changing decisions, and spiritual experiences

I assure you, your church needs you. And it needs you to be there this

Sunday. Faithfulness to the House of God is still a required characteristic for believers. From time to time we all need sabbaticals, vacations, and sick days. But when missing church becomes a regular or extended practice, we not only stymie our spiritual growth, we weaken the abilities of the entire congregation. I would like to encourage you to be in your place, ready for worship, and thank God He has purchased a place for you to attend. Now that, my friend, is even better than Georgia football!!

Isaiah 9:1-7

Key Verse: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness— on them light has shined." Isaiah 9:2

Time: mid 700's BCE

Background: God's split kingdom (the Northern Kingdom of Israel and the Southern Kingdom of

Judah), was in constant conflict over social and theological issues. Each held its own capital and often worked to gain alliances with neighboring kingdoms to gain power.

First Isaiah (chapters 1-39) was written at a time when the Northern Kingdom, Israel, was being defeated by Assyria, bringing the kingdom to an end. The message of hope for a future would be received by a broken and suffering community.

Community: What social and theological issues are debated in your community of faith? Where do the debates prevent action? Where do they lead to positive social change? How might prayer and study of scripture inform those debates?

At Home: Where or from what do you suffer? How does your faith affect your attitude and your healing? Who could you involve in your faith journey that might help alleviate your suffering? Contact that person or people this week and ask for help.

SCRIPTURE VERSE FOR THE WEEK

God says through the prophet Isaiah:

"Those who walked in the dark have seen a bright light. And it shines upon everyone who lives in the land of darkest shadows." – Isaiah 9:2 (CEV)

PRAYER FOR THE WEEK

God of light, when we are troubled, when we are afraid, when we are sad, when it is dark—remind us you are the light that no darkness can overcome. Amen.

A BLESSING TO SHARE

Use these words to bless another person: Make your light shine, so that others will see the good that you do and will praise your Father in heaven. Amen. (Matthew 5:16, CEV)

DAILY BIBLE READINGS

As we approach Advent, our Bible readings move toward the end of the Old Testament. All the readings this week are God's words spoken through the prophets to God's people at a time when they had little hope.

Usually, there is a description after each text in the list. This week, take a hand at writing some of your own. On the lines below, write a phrase that describes God's good news for that reading. For example, Isaiah 9:1-7 foretells the birth of a child who will become a great and peaceful ruler. Isaiah 12:1-6 tells of God's anger turning away from the people.

CARING CONVERSATIONS

The readings from the prophet Isaiah this week are words of good news to God's people, spoken when their hope had grown dim. Recall times you received some good news. *Who delivered this good news? What were your feelings when you heard it?*

DEVOTIONS

Light a candle during your times of devotion and prayer at home as a symbol of God's light in Christ. Try shaping devotions around the following basic pattern:

- Gathering Prayer. Light a candle to help you focus on the presence of Christ in your midst. Pray the "Prayer for the Week."
- Caring Conversations. Take a moment to discuss the ideas and questions in "Caring Conversations."
- Daily Bible Reading. Read aloud the Bible passage suggested for the day. What do you want to remember from this reading?
- Blessing to Share. Bless another person, using "A Blessing to Share."

SERVICE

As you recall Isaiah 9:1-7, think some more about the image of light shining in darkness. Then do a little research about the differences between the varieties of high efficiency light bulbs and regular incandescent light bulbs. Discuss how switching the type of light bulbs you use might be a service to creation.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

Advent is coming. This is a funny phrase, since the word *advent* means "coming." The season of Advent is the time of counting down and preparing for our Lord's coming. Christians wait for the celebration of Jesus' birth and also for Christ to come today and tomorrow in ways that soothe human suffering and bring hope, joy, and peace.

This week's reading from Isaiah 9 is sometimes read in worship during Advent—how might Isaiah's words about light and darkness be connected with Advent? Many Christians light candles on an Advent wreath to mark the four Sundays of Advent. (This year, Advent begins December 1.) If you are not familiar with this ritual, do a little online research on Advent wreaths and plan to use this tradition for counting down to Christmas in your home.
